By treating the items as art, Leask says it's easy to work them into your decor. Leask says displays for collections can

be as easy as propping up some dolls on a bed or framing a stamp collection. Antique clothing can be set up as a display in an entrance or in a guest bed-room. Glass display cases turned into coffee tables become conversation pieces.

Like materials grouped together can add a new dimension to any home. Leask suggests taking precautions for valuable items by keeping dust and fin-
